Four basic elements involved in online outreach...

- 1. Internet Resources Websites/Facebook pages: m4mHealthySex.org and Need2Know.com
- 2. Online Sexual Health Education Provide HIV and STI testing resources, HIV care, PrEP referrals, and general sexual health information via internet-based venues
- **3. Health Alerts** Short informative bulletins regarding sexual health utilizing HPCP websites and Facebook pages and email list service
- **4. HIV Self-Test Kit Program** Providing free HIV test kits through the mail to anyone who resides in PA

- Created in 2012 (as a beta project for the Pitt Men's Study)
- Updated to WordPress in 2014 with 2,500 visitors
- More than 28,000 visitors in 2022

- Created in 2021 as a "sister site" to m4m, 1,300 visitors

Online Sexual Health Educators

Outreach to MSM in chat venues like Grindr, Adam4Adam, Scruff, and Jack'd

- 2015 560 individuals contacts were made
- 2016 Contacts increased to 762
- 2017 Contacts reached a peak of 1,224
- 2018 Contacts declined to 865 (loss of Craigslist)
- 2019 Contacts dropped again to 695
- 2020 333 contacts (Grindr, Scruff bans)
- 2021 290 contacts
- 2022 Contacts decline to 210

Online Outreach began shifting resources to advertising and expanding the reach of "Health Alerts" in 2020.



Health Alerts

Health Alerts are short public health announcements (generally pertaining to HIV/STIs and sexual health) posted on HPCP websites, Facebook pages, Instagram accounts, and advertised on Grindr, with links to more detailed information.

Health Alerts' Reach

- 2017 9 alerts were received by an estimated 20,000 recipients
- 2018 12 alerts were received by an estimated 38,000 recipients
- 2019 2020 Resources and funding for one-on-one outreach in chat rooms shifted to Health Alert, resulting in 60 ad campaigns. In the two-year period, there were 1,900,000 impressions and over 36,000 interactions (clicks, likes, shares, and comments)
- 2021 214 individual ad campaigns, resulting in 705,780 impressions and 25,000 individual engagements (clicks, likes, shares, and comments)
- 2022 200 individual ad campaigns, 3,688,458 impressions and 61,000 interactions

Health Alerts have a "built in" audience of 10,000 followers on Facebook and Instagram, with an addition 1,000 individuals who opted to receive "additional HIV/STI information" through the HST program.

The *getmyHIVtest.com* program was created by the Pennsylvania Expanded HIV Testing Initiative at Penn State University and the HIV Prevention and Care Project (HPCP) at the University of Pittsburgh, with support from the Pennsylvania Department of Health. Our goal is to ensure testing is available for anyone who wants to be tested.

The best way to test for HIV is at a clinic or doctor's office. To find testing near you, go to the CDC's HIV and STI testing locator at https://gettested.cdc.gov/. If you don't have medical insurance, most clinics provide testing at little or no cost.

OraQuick[®] is the first FDA-approved in-home test for HIV. It's an oral swab test that doesn't require blood, and it's based on the same HIV test that healthcare professionals have used since 2004. OraQuick[®] also provides expert advice on how to take the test and can help with finding resources if the test is positive. What you should know before you order a test kit

It can take a while for the immune system to produce enough antibodies for the test to detect. While most people (97%) will develop detectable antibodies in the first 3 months after the initial infection, some will not. Therefore, a negative result does not mean that you are definitely not infected with HIV, particularly when exposure may have been within the previous three months. If you think you may have been exposed recently, you may want to get a second test after a 3month period to verify your negative result.



If you think you've been recently exposed to HIV (in the last 2 days), consider taking **PEP** (postexposure prophylaxis). PEP is an antiretroviral medication you can take after being exposed to HIV to prevent becoming infected. You can get PEP from your doctor, from local health clinics, and even from any hospital emergency room. Also, for those who are HIV negative, but are at an ongoing risk of HIV, PrEP (Pre-exposure prophylaxis) is a medication that significantly reduces the risk of HIV infection. To find out more about PrEP and to locate local providers, go to the HPCP's **PrEP information page**.  - 48k visitors to the website
 - 1,083 orders placed
 - 968 kits shipped
 - 106 Philadelphia County residents referred to *phillykeeponloving.com*
- **2022** 40% increase in orders
 - 31k visitors
 - 1,732 orders placed
 - 1,654 kits shipped
 - 68 referred to *phillykeeponloving.com*

2021 - Previous testing:

- 45% Not tested in the last 6 months
- 32% Never tested
- 12% Not sure/No answer
- 11% Tested between 1 and 6 months
- 2022 Previous testing:
 - 44% Not tested in the last 6 months
 - 24% Never tested
 - 18% Tested between 3 and 6 months
 - 14% Not sure

80% requested condoms with their kit 30% requested more HIV/STI information

All orders are followed up with a link to an **online questionnaire** sent to given email address.

- Age
- Gender identity

- Identify as transgender
- Sex assigned at birth

Average response rate 11.3%

55.4% - Male (90% identified as gay/bi) 39.2% - Female (26% Black/59% white) 03.6% - Nonbinary/genderqueer/3rd gender 01.6% - Prefer not to answer "Was better for reaching homeless people and easy to use no stigma."

"Great program, especially for someone like me who lives in a rural setting and doesn't have easy access to an in-person option."

"As someone who has done thousands of these tests on program participants, I thought the home testing kit packaging and instructions were actually overly complicated and daunting..." "Add more condom."

"You should specify that it's [getmyHIVtest.com] associated through PA DOH in your website because your website seems too good to be true (and thus looks fake/spam/scam)."
